A Sinking Feeling

On 22nd April it was noticed that ground at Marston Road Playing Field was sinking in a number of places. In one section, in the centre of the football field, a wooden pole placed on the ground sank by 1 metre. A further section approximately 15m long had also begun to sink.

Local enquiries were made and advice sought from a number of organisations including the British Geological Survey Team and the Environment Agency.

Initial investigations suggest that a drainage pipe installed 30 years ago may have collapsed. Sections of ground will need to be excavated in order to confirm the cause and identify how far the problem extends.

The Health and Safety Executive has advised that the site should remain closed until all remedial work is completed.

The Parish Council is working with local companies to repair the damage and restore the field as soon as possible. In the meantime, please avoid the area and if you have children, please urge them to stay away for their own safety.

Thank you for your cooperation.

Destroyed Verges

The Parish Council has been working with Highways to restore grass verges that have been destroyed by vehicles either parking on them or travelling over them as they go around corners.

The verges at Ivetsey Road and on the corner of Broadholes Lane have been restored and then appear to have been damaged again by vehicles.

The Parish Council politely requests that drivers avoid parking and driving on verges particularly at Ivetsey Road, Lapley Road, Broadholes Lane and Fentonhouse Lane. The entrances to Wheaton Aston are looking untidy because of the damage and it becomes harder to persuade Highways to repair verges when they are persistently damaged.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2016

The past year has been yet another year of change for the Parish Council.

The Parish Council administrative office has moved to the new Business Hub at South Staffordshire Council's premises. This move is not only more economical but also provides better opportunity for our Manager to liaise with district council staff and staff from other agencies who operate from the hub.

The Parish Council developed its new website in 2015 and I hope that residents are finding it helpful. The council's use of social media has increased and we now have over 260 followers on Facebook & over 100 followers on twitter.

The Parish Council exists to serve the Parish and my Chairman's Report covers the following topics of maintenance, events and other matters that have been dealt with by the Parish Council during the past year.

Maintenance throughout the parish, in particular, grass cutting is required to keep our play areas, verges, cemeteries and churchyards and all open spaces in an acceptable condition. I would like to express, on behalf of the Parish Council, our thanks to our main grass cutting contractor Bloomin' Gardens and Landscapes Ltd for the co-operative and diligent way in which they carry out their work



The Parish Council has made great efforts to get the best value for money from its maintenance contracts however a large percentage of the precept continues to be spent on grass cutting, fence repairs and general maintenance, particularly of churchyards. The difficult decision to cease cutting the grass in our three churchyards from April 2016 has been taken. A grant has been made to each church this year in the hope that it will enable them to purchase some grass cutting equipment to use in future.

The many black and white finger posts, which are a distinctive feature of our Parish, continue to be maintained with care by Mr. Rob Cox.

The Parish Council liaises closely with South Staffordshire District Council to ensure that open spaces owned or maintained by them are also well-kept.

The Parish Council's Village Orderly, Mr. Bissell completes many jobs in our villages and along with Mrs. Davies and Mrs. Morris our two Litter Pickers improves the appearance of the Parish substantially. On behalf of the Parish Council, I thank them for their efforts as well as Mr. Cadman who, once again has supplied and maintained the floral displays to a high standard.

I would also like to thank Stretton WI for planting and watering in Stretton last year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many volunteers who take time to look after areas in the vicinity of their properties and in particular Mr. Darrant for his ongoing safety inspections of play equipment at Primrose Bank Play Area.



All three villages were entered in the annual Best Kept Village competition, run by the Community Council of Staffordshire. Lapley was awarded third Place in the Small Village Category in South Staffordshire and Stretton and Wheaton Aston were both highly commended.

The lack of community involvement in the competition was criticised by the judges and I hope that more residents will get involved this year.

Many thanks to the children of St Mary's School and Stretton who produced posters for the Best Kept Village Competition which are displayed throughout the three villages during the competition period.

Regular visits from the Neighbourhood Highway Teams continue and they deal with an extended list of smaller non-safety related problems such as ditch regrading, fencing, weeding & painting and small environmental improvement schemes. If as residents of the parish you notice a problem with reference to the highways please report the problem through the dedicated telephone number which can be obtained by looking at the News & Views under Key Contacts or let the Parish Council Manager be aware of the problem. The Parish Council are still in contact with Staffordshire County Highways with reference to the necessary improvements to Leeke Way and the surface water on the road from Wenlock Bank to Lapley.

Jan Wright, the Village Agent, continues to work on behalf of the Parish Council and community groups. I would like to thank Jan for all the hours she has devoted to this Parish.

Broadholes Lane Nature Garden has been well used and has recently been re-opened for the summer. We have recently received grant funding to make small improvements, which should improve the small orchard and encourage more wildlife to visit the nature garden. There are fruit trees in the garden and residents are very welcome to take the fruit for their own personal use.

PC Peter Clark, our neighbourhood officer and PCSO Adam McAree continue to police our area and I thank the police for their hard work to keep our parish safe, despite ever dwindling resources.

Dog Fouling and litter dropping are anti–social and causing the Parish considerable expense. I urge that minority of people who are guilty of such behaviour to please use the bins provided. The parish council, with the support of South Staffordshire Council has provided new anti -dog fouling signage and sprayed signs on our footpaths. If you see someone failing to pick up dog mess please call 01902 696000 to report them.

Vandalism at Marston Road Field remains at a high level. Graffiti and damage has occurred on the Skate Park, trees damaged and fires lit in the nature area. The litter problem also continues there.



The majority of young people that visit and play on the equipment treat the area and equipment with respect, as always it is the minority that cause the problems.

The parish council with WAPSWG were successful in obtaining grants from district councillors Brian Cox and Roy Wright, county councillor Mark Sutton and the Police and Crime Commissioner to fund work, which we hope will reduce crime at the playing field by increasing visibility and improving the general appearance of the site.

As the wooden play equipment at Primrose Bank Play Area was nearing the end of its useful life, the parish council decided to remove it. It is planned to install replacement equipment aimed at very young children and as soon as

designs have been received, we will consult with neighbouring residents and local children on the equipment to be installed.

Many organisations outside the village receive grants from the Parish Council, for example Brewood and District Voluntary Car Scheme. I would like to remind our parishioners that the voluntary car scheme is short of drivers from this Parish.

Once again, the Christmas Lights Switch On Evening was a success. The people who attended were entertained by the excellent Oakengates Salvation Army Band and local acts from the village and our local school. Jason Bate, our stand-in compere, did an excellent job and professional sound and lighting technicians were hired for the first time. I would like to thank Mike Groom for his advice and guidance on the sound system and for volunteering his time so generously. A special thanks to the Christmas Lights Working Group and the Parish Council Manager for their dedication and hard work in making the evening such a success and finally, my thanks to everyone who attended making the evening a friendly and enjoyable village get together. I would also like to thank Mr. Busby who provided the stage again.

Our links with our Sister City Wheaton in Illinois are maintained by the Cowley family and the Parish Council thank them for all their time and effort.

The Parish Council held a Chairman's Civic Sunday in 2015 and thanked, in particular, Sarah Lockitt for her design of the parish council's logo and Ray Cowley for his service to our community over a number of years.

Once again our finances are in order and well managed, and the Internal Auditor has concluded that the Parish Council's system of internal controls is satisfactory. The External Auditor has also passed the accounts and states that there are no issues to raise for the Council to consider.

It was disappointing this year that the district council again decided not to pass on the Council Tax Support Grant, which was intended by central government to be passed on to parish councils.

In preparation for a busy year, the Parish Council has set a significantly increased budget for 2016/17. Over the past decade the parish council has taken on 3 play areas, a skate park and bus shelter. Some are now in need of significant repair, all require maintenance, insurance, repair, inspection and management. The parish council also owns several pieces of land and over 100 trees which are in need of essential work.

The parish council is looking to make some modest improvements to enhance life in the parish. Lapley Green will be neatened up, the noticeboard replaced and the telephone box will be repainted and fitted with a defibrillator.

In Wheaton Aston, the parish council has agreed to adopt the new war memorial, install planters at the 3 entrances to Wheaton Aston and a replacement bus shelter on High Street.



The parish council has decided to contribute to Wheaton Aston Community First Responders' much needed new vehicle, as well as the carnival committee and the Voluntary Car Service which many residents rely on to get to doctor and hospital appointments.

Administration and staffing always forms the major component of our annual budget. Compliance with new legislative changes inevitably involves increased work and we have now reached a point where this can no longer be absorbed as part of the Parish council manager's contracted hours. The parish council has decided to provide some part-time administrative support.

Some of the council's IT equipment reached the end of its useful life and had to be replaced in 2015. The new IT system will be more secure and support the parish council to better comply with the Data Protection Act.

These new administrative and staffing costs will be offset to some degree by the financial savings we are making through the relocation of the administrative office to improved facilities at the South Staffordshire Business Hub. In 2016/17 Administration will form 59% of our budget compared with 55% for 2015/16.

Although the % increase in precept seems high, it actually equates to an additional 57p per week per Band D household.

I congratulate Mrs. Debra Bate, our Parish Council Manager, for keeping the finances in good order, making savings wherever possible and ensuring that the council stays within its budget.

I would like to remind the Parish that Parish Councillors attend not only the regular monthly Parish Council meetings but also Working Group meetings, external meetings and training courses. We are volunteers and do not receive any form of payment for either our time or expenses. In 2015, the council decided that it was only fair to reimburse councillors for their mileage costs if they travel to meetings or training sessions outside of the parish.

Finally, my thanks, as Chairman, to all the Councillors and the Parish Council Manager for the work they do on behalf of us all in representing our interests and welfare. I wish them well for the forthcoming year.

Staffordshire Police would like to pass on to South Staffordshire residents either crime prevention advice or road safety information on a monthly basis. This month's focus is:

Vehicle security information

- Ensure your vehicle is securely locked and that alarms or immobilisers are switched on.
- Never leave keys in the ignition if you move away from your vehicle - even to pop back indoors while it warms up, to go into a shop or to use a cash machine.
- Remember to shut all windows and the sun roof.
- Remove all items from view including your sat nav and its cradle.

They're a small team and are always looking for new members, both as active responders and as supporters to help with things like publicity and fundraising.

Training as a volunteer responder works in progressive stages, and is run by West Midlands Ambulance Service NHS FT. Initial training is held over a series of weekends and teaches volunteers to understand and deal with life-threatening emergencies, including controlling severe bleeding and using oxygen therapy and automated external defibrillators.

Help Requested To Report Potholes

The Parish Council regularly reports potholes and other highways defects to Staffordshire Highways, however very few residents from the parish are reporting potholes. Highways can only schedule the repair of a pothole if it is reported to them. This can be done via email to highways@staffordshire.gov.uk, by phone on 0300 111 8000 or via the app MyStaffs.

If you see a pothole, don't assume that it has already been reported. Please report it as soon as possible.
